ROUNDTABLE LECTURE OPENS MID-CENTURY CELEBRATION

On Saturday October 8[,] 2016 at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in La Mesa over a hundred aficionados of Mid-Century Modern architecture and lifestyle met for the Society's History Roundtable event. This special 3-hour event opened our Mid-Century Modern season, serving as a prelude to the November 5th Home Tour.

The program opened with Society President, historian and master of ceremonies Jim Newland providing both an introduction and short presentation on the La Mesa and Mt. Helix areas' cutting-edge architectural heritage. Landscape architect and Lloyd Ruocco historian Todd Pitman followed with a detailed discussion of the San Diego Modernist pioneer's local work. Newland returned for a brief presentation on the breadth of the Mid-Century Modern style landscape of the Mt. Helix area. After a brief break and refreshments provided by host St. Andrew's Church, Mid-Century architect John Mock spoke on his projects in Mt. Helix and La Mesa, including the two featured in this year's home tour. Modern San Diego webmaster and historian Keith York followed with a conversation with Mock and fellow architect Hal Sadler. Both discussed the Mid-Century architectural scene in San Diego and the importance of the homes they designed that were featured on this year's tour. The Mid-Century Mt. Helix Roundtable proving to be one of the best attended and memorable of our popular long-running series.

In Memoriam: Gordon Jones

Gordon Jones, president of the La Mesa Historical from 2002-2010, died Sunday, January 15, 2017 at his home in La Mesa Village. Gordon had numerous health scares since a quadruple bypass in 2006, although he continued to give back to the Society and the La Mesa community.

Gordon was a native of Pasadena, raised in a small Oregon logging town and a proud University of Oregon graduate. He was a retired CEO of Denver's Coors family foundation and member of numerous non-profit boards nationally.

While president of the Historical Society he organized the first Historic Home Tour in 2006 and served as chairman of this popular event until 2011. He also was a member of the City of La Mesa's Historic Preservation Commission until this past year, was actively involved in land marking several La Mesa historic homes and wrote a downtown walking tour booklet.

Gordon was preceded in death by his wife Carol. He is survived by his daughter Shelly. He will be sorely missed and long-remembered.





On February 10, 2017 a Celebration of Life Ceremony was held for Gordon Jones at the Historical Society. Friends and family shared memories of Gordon and Carol Jones. Funds donated in their name will go to the upcoming historical landscape rehabilitation project.

Collections Corner: STRAIGHT RAZOR and RAZOR STROP



Various forms of razors were used throughout history, which are different in appearance but similar in use to modern straight razors. In prehistoric times clam shells, shark teeth and flint were sharpened and used to shave with. Excavations in Egypt have unearthed solid gold and copper razors in tombs dating back to the 4th millennium BC.


Several razors were recovered from Bronze Age burials in northern Europe and the razor was introduced in ancient Rome in the 6th century BC. The first modern straight razor complete with decorated handles and ground blades was constructed in Sheffield, England in the 18th century.

Daily shaving was not a widespread practice in the 19th century so some people never shaved. The custom of shaving every day among American men is a 20th-century innovation which was started after World War I. Men were required to shave daily so their gas masks would fit properly and this became much easier with the advent of the safety razor, which was standard issue during the war.

Straight razors were the most common form of shaving before the 20th century and remained common in many countries until the 1950's. Straight razors eventually fell out of fashion. Their first challenger was manufactured by King C. Gillette: a double-edged safety razor with replaceable blades.

A razor strop is a flexible strip of leather, canvas, balsa wood or other soft material, used for straightening and polishing (stropping) the blade of a straight razor.

RE-LIVING HISTORY

Grossmont High history teacher Donald Ginn shares this story from one of his students involved in the 2015 Japanese-American History Project completed in his AP U.S. History class. Mr. Ginn partnered with the Society on this project. Donna Niemeier and Jim Newland helped the students with their research on former Japanese-American Foothiller students who had been interned during World War II. The Society also co-sponsored their public presentations at the school in February 2016. We then featured their findings in the McKinney House exhibit room in the Summer and Fall of 2016.

Ginn received this photo and email in August from student Sam Jungman on his visit to Manzanar National Historic Site:

Hello Mr. Ginn,

I hope you enjoyed your summer and are excited for the new school year to commence. Below I have attached a photo that I thought you might appreciate. If you recall Bradley Justice's Japanese-Foothiller project two years ago, he talked about how his Japanese American subject, Thomas Hashimoto along with several other Boy Scouts, linked up arms to protect the flagpole from the group of hot-headed Japanese Americans who sought to tore it down during the infamous Manzanar Camp riot. Well during a road trip, my friends and I decided to honor Thomas Hashimoto by having 5 Eagle Scouts link arms in front of the Manzanar flagpole. I have linked the photo below of us five Eagle Scouts in front of Manzanar's flagpole and I thought you might appreciate it.

In Spring 2016, Mr. Ginn's A.P. students researched former Foothillers who gave their lives in service to their country. We hope to repeat our sponsorship again in 2017 for a presentation and perhaps another exhibition.

Thanks again to Mr. Ginn and his talented and exceptional history students.


