STOP AND SMELL THE ROSES

LANDSCAPE UPDATE

The front yard of the McKinney House Museum is finally starting to bloom. “The multi-year landscape project is coming to fruition,” said project chair, Tracey Stotz. Planter boxes filled with red geraniums line the front porch. Plants, including sword fern, hibiscus and snowball bush, which were found in photos of the house from the museum’s interpretive period, have been planted along the house. Irrigation has been expanded to include the garden areas.

Probably the most impactful change is the new memorial rose garden. Those who have been involved with the Society for several years may remember the memorial rose garden that was tucked along the east side of the McKinney House. It was a fundraiser for the Society. A donation was made in recognition of a loved one and that loved one’s name was added to a plaque that stood with the roses.

As part of the landscape renovation, the rose garden has been expanded and pulled out to the front of the house so passersby can also enjoy the lovely roses. The old picket fence has been removed and new trellis fencing has been added. Cecile Brunner roses will be trained up the trellis as they grow. Additional fragrant roses, in a palette of pinks, have been planted between the sidewalk to the house and the trellis. A brick path leads to a new bench in the garden which will allow guests to

stop and smell the roses as well as gaze at the house museum. The next step will be to add mulch and the names of those memorialized in the rose garden.

A gorgeous custom bench is another new addition to the landscape. What makes this wood bench so special is it was made from the enormous 100-year-old Monterey Pine that originally shaded the property. Local artist Brian Pedersen collected a large piece of wood at the time the dead tree was removed in 2020. He allowed the wood to dry then created a spectacular piece which is as much art as a functional bench. It is installed in the landscape overlooking the young pine tree.

Kew Gardens shrub roses have been added along the street. Although bare root now, they will fill in along the new period-feel fencing that was added along University Avenue and wraps along Pine Street. These small-thorned white roses echo the Cherokee roses that originally lined University Avenue but will serve as a safer choice for pedestrian traffic.


The next big project will be the new sign along University Avenue. Mock-ups of the sign have been done and fabrication should be completed by the summer. After that watch for a shade ramada added to the side yard, a display case for large collection items back by the archives building, rolling planters in the backyard and interpretive signs throughout the property.



“To say this was a group effort is an understatement,” said Stotz. From the many individuals who purchased landscape bricks or made large donations to the in-kind support provided by RCP Brick and Block, and La Mesa Lumber there were at least 100 donors. Physical labor was provided by Israel Marquez’s team at Marquez Lopez Landscape as well as volunteers. “One of my favorite days during the project was when we planted the roses along University,” said Stotz. Volunteers Donna Bloomer, Jake Johnson,

Karolyn Malmin, Sharon Smith and Stotz dug through rock and clay to prep the soil and plant the roses. “It always feels good when you put some sweat equity into a project,” she added.

If you would like to be part of the team, led by Board members Michele Greenberg-McClung and Sheryl Castro, that pulls weeds around the lemon trees please contact the Society. Much of the installation is done but volunteers are needed to keep the site looking good. Inscribed landscape bricks are also still available for a \$100 donation. The next order will most likely be placed in early summer. Go to the website, lamesahistory.com, and click under Donate then Annual Capital Campaign Funding to purchase a brick.




