

The exhibit highlights the role of the La Mesa Pioneers (a group of early residents of La Mesa) and the La Mesa America's Bicentennial Committee in the formation of the La Mesa Historical Society in 1975 and how the McKinney House became the group's home. Also celebrated is the role of the La Mesa Quilters in supporting the early work of the Society and how the Annual Home Tour has become the group's signature event.




MATCHING GIFT ISSUED TO WRAP UP THE SITE RENOVATION

19TH ANNUAL LA MESA HISTORY CENTER 2025 HOME TOUR "GOLDEN GEMS OF LA MESA"

Featuring Historic Downtown La Mesa Date Avenue Historic District, Parks Addition, & Boulder Heights Saturday November 8th 9am-3pm

The La Mesa History Center Home Tour presents its 19th annual Home Tour as we commemorate our own institution's 50th anniversary. In October 1975 a history-minded group of La Mesa residents incorporated the La Mesa Historical Society. Their interest in preserving local history also grew to incorporate historic preservation and a recognition of the unique, impressive, and significant architectural heritage of the Greater La Mesa region. In this our "Golden Anniversary Year" we will be offering some of La Mesa's "Golden Gem" properties for viewing.

Since 2006 the Society (now known as the History Center) has put on an Annual Home Tour to share this architectural heritage with our tour ticket holders from both near and far. Our Home Tour, with its free-style touring format, has earned a well-deserved reputation as one of the most popular and welcoming home tours in the county.

This year our home tour returns to the streets and hills surrounding downtown La Mesa, the

Jewel of the Hills. Our tour will feature an eclectic mixture of Folk Victorian, Craftsman, Prairie Style, and Spanish Eclectic designs emblematic of these historic neighborhoods. The Society's last tour here in 2023 was a great success. This year promises to be another outstanding event highlighting these historic neighborhoods, their distinctive properties along with the significant designers, builders, artists/artisans, and historically significant residents and families featured at these landmark homes. It will also let us honor our present proud owners who continue to preserve and steward these landmark properties.

This year's History Center's tour also features another significant and long-standing local institution that is currently celebrating its own 130th anniversary—La Mesa First United Methodist Church.

Historic Community Gem Homes

The preservation of each of the featured tour properties also highlights the history of some

of the most prominent and fascinating families, individuals, and long-standing institutions in La Mesa history. These include the 1910 Sherman Grable House, a Prairie Style influenced home built for the prominent local developer, business and civic leader, and recently confirmed as the work world-renown architect Irving J. Gill; the 1922 John and Charlotte King House, a classic Craftsman style home with rustic landscape and City views; the 1935 Chester Herritt Home, an unique Spanish Eclectic gem with art and artisanship throughout, built for the influential Irrigation District manager and designed by San Diego architect William Wheeler during his partnership with the Dennstedt Company; the 1912 Caldwell House, a beautiful and authentic Craftsman home with period retro landscape and restored interior woodwork and built-ins; the magnificently restored, rehabilitated and tastefully decorated 1911 Russell/Sprung House a Craftsman gem; the aforementioned La Mesa First United Methodist Church featuring Los Angeles architect Arthur Lindley's 1922 Spanish Colonial church and San Diego architect F.D. Harrington's 1955 Spanish Contemporary style interpretations; as well as the History Center's own home, the 1908 Henry & Florence McKinney House, a Folk Victorian farmhouse typical of the Midwestern roots of many early La Mesa residents and featuring a new exhibit on our own history.

These special homes also provide us an opportunity to thank the current owners who steward these properties preservation today. All tastefully and compatibly furnished, artistically decorated, maintained, and wonderfully landscaped, they continue to provide the current homeowners and their families, the same functions, and assets that the original owners experienced for these many generations.

La Mesa's Suburban Roots Revealed

For La Mesa's early 20th century home makers and community builders, the former citrus ranches around the La Mesa Springs Depot and its Lookout Ave (now La Mesa Boulevard) businesses were rapidly subdivided into suburban house lots between 1906 to 1912. Two newcomers named Sherman Grable and C.C. Park were the main catalysts for this conversion.

Their Park-Grable Investment Company not only developed these tracts but helped form the Bank of La Mesa to help finance the fledgling community and an Improvement Club that would evolve into the original La Mesa Chamber of Commerce to help promote—and eventually motivate—the small community of approximately 700 residents to incorporate in February 1912.

This year's Tour taps into these "Progressive Era" ideals of Arts and Crafts aesthetic and indoor-outdoor California lifestyle. Three are beautiful Craftsman landmark homes dating from 1911 to 1922. Visitors will be presented with these wonderful period examples including those built by local early contractors such as J.B. Davis, David C. Marker and Henry L. Russell. The Irving J. Gill designed Grable House provides a cutting-edge example of Gill's work at the height of his influential career.

It is not designed in the revolutionary, austere, proto-Modern style that shunned all ornament and for which Gill is now renown. The Grable's English half-timber facade, roof lines, and Prairie influenced elements of clean lines show his adaptation of these elements to southern California's mild climate and indoor-outdoor lifestyles—and likely the client's aesthetic interests.

These can be contrasted with our oldest tour home the 1908 Folk Victorian farmhouse built for Rev. Henry A. McKinney, wife Florence, and their family. Typical of the homes many Midwestern emigrants to La Mesa constructed at that time, the McKinney House, now home to the La Mesa History Center and City Historic Landmark #1, invites guests to see recent upgrades, especially the Center's recent efforts to return the site's landscape to its agricultural roots as a citrus ranch.

Also, new exhibits commemorating the History Center's 50th Golden Anniversary and the organization's founders will be displayed. These exhibits illuminating on our half-century old non-for-profit institution's efforts in preserving Greater La Mesa's history and promoting historic preservation locally.

La Mesa Methodist Church, A Pioneering Institution

The History Center is also proud to partner with the La Mesa First United Methodist Church, one of the longest standing institutions in La Mesa. The Church has been a vital community asset for 130 years. The Southern Conference of the Methodist Church formally established the La Mesa Methodist Episcopal Church in November 1895. It was the first church to be established in what was then known as Allison Springs. (The La Mesa Congregational Church being established in October 1895 in the La Mesa Townsite at today's College Area centered at 70th and El Cajon Boulevard).

With the San Diego Cuyamaca & Eastern Railway depot, and subsequently the La Mesa Post Office, located at Allison Springs, developer/landowners Andrew Crowder and Joseph Allison subdivided the land around the depot and renamed the fledgling community La Mesa Spring in 1895. Crowder's La Mesa Lemon Company built a store and packing house across the street from the depot. In that same year the locals created the Allison School (the La Mesa School being established at the townsite in 1891).





Photo showing 1908 Methodist Church, former buildings used for services, and the empty future location at Lemon and Palm Avenues.

The La Mesa Methodist Episcopal Church used both the Allison School and the second floor "hall" at the packing house for services in these early years.

In 1908 the Church completed its first building at the southeast corner of Lemon and Palm Avenues. In 1921 they brought in noted Glendale architect Arthur Lindley who designed the classic Spanish Colonial style church constructed by local contractors Marker and Russell across the street on the southwest corner where it stands today. This beautiful and functional sanctuary served the growing congregation until the early 1950s. At that point the church brought in noted San Diego architect F. D. (Frank) Harrington to complete additional buildings for a campus school and a larger modern sanctuary. Both architects are noted for their numerous church commissions throughout southern California.

The Church's campus facilities were enlarged and adapted over the years as the renamed First United Methodist Church continues to serve the greater La Mesa community.

Recently First United Methodist participated in a planning charette with national non-profit Sacred Places that included local designers and community members to help create a renewed vision for maximizing this historic and essential community institution's campus.
