LA MESA DEPOT RESTORATION PROJECT UPDATE:

The washbasin and toilet are not yet installed, most of the light fixtures are not yet in place, and there's some touchup painting to do. Other than that, restoration of the Depot is now complete. Congratulations to PSRMA Project Director Larry Rose and his staff.

There are some tears, too. The light fixtures should be in place. But in early June Al Barnier, PSRMA member, who is doing most of the electrical work, had his truck stolen. In the truck were the light fixtures which had been donated by Norm Hill.

DEPOT Cont.

City-sponsored Linear Park landscaping, now underway, includes the treeplanting in the area from La Mesa Blvd. to Fresno, and from Allison to I-8. Landscaping between La Mesa Blvd. and Allison awaits the next redevelopment building phase.

Other equipment needed for the station will take some time to acquire, but it is expected by summer's end the Depot will be officially opened. At this writing, there are no further details about the rolling stock exhibit.

At the dedication ceremony thank yous will be in order. For now, let us say that restoration has been the responsibility of PSRMA and its workers. However, contributions of money, materials and/or services have been many. Included are individuals, agencies, and firms from all over Southern California. City of La Mesa/Federal Funds, plus those mentioned above have been invaluable. But, there remains the need for funding of acquisition of Depot furniture, not to mention the financing needed for the placement of a rolling stock exhibit.
